**Research** is when we gather information to learn more about a topic.



Researchers at universities can work together with lots of different people

• People with disability

• Disability organisations and service providers

Support workers

• Family and friends



We call these people **co-researchers**.


**Co-researchers** are people involved in the research who are not academic researchers.



**Co-production** means doing research together. People with disability are included in the research process.

# **Booklet 3 Doing research together**



This step is called

Doing research together.



In this step we start to do the things that are in our research plan.



We look at

- Our ethics
- Finding the right people to talk to
- Asking those people our questions





#### **Ethics**

Ethics means making sure that research

- Is fair
- Does not harm anyone

#### Universities have an ethics committee

- They look at our plan to check whether it is okay
- · We might need to make some changes

### Fieldwork



In this step we go out into the community and collect information.

This is called fieldwork.



This is when we can get in touch with disability groups to find people with disability who want to be in our research.

This is called recruitment.



Researchers and co-researchers can be involved in collecting data.

Data is the information that people tell us.



Data can be collected in different ways.

For example

- Interviews
- Surveys
- Watching people do an activity

# **Co-production in fieldwork**



Having people with lived experience of disability doing fieldwork is important.

This is co-production in fieldwork.



Co-production makes sure we get data in a way that is safe and accessible for everyone.



The co-researchers suggest the best way to work with people.



People in our research might feel better talking to someone with the same experience as them.



Working together when we do fieldwork shows we respect the people we talk to.

# Making fieldwork safe



Co-researchers might hear things that really upset them.



Hearing these things might bring up bad feelings about something that has happened to them before.



The team should do a risk assessment.

A **risk assessment** is a plan to keep everyone safe.



In the risk assessment we

- Make a list of things that we think could go wrong
- Plan how we will stop these things from happening
- Decide what we will do if something goes wrong



The researcher or co-researcher might know the person they are talking to.

This is a risk we need to think about.



If we know the person it could affect

- The way we get the information
- Our friendship or relationship with them
- Their privacy we might find out new information about them

# Things we can do together when we do fieldwork



Help the ethics committee to learn about co-production with people with disability.



Find the right people and talk to them in a safe and respectful way.



Make sure we get the information in a way that is right and clear for the

- Project
- Research team
- · People we talk to



Think about what we learnt about doing fieldwork together and tell other people about it, so they can learn.

# Working together makes our fieldwork better



Our research is fairer and safer.



The way we talk to people is safe and respectful.



The way we do our fieldwork is accessible.
