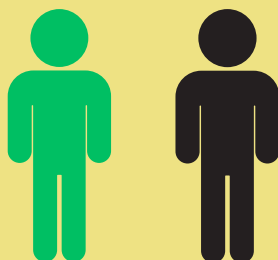

# Ageing ≠ Disability

## ...but the challenges often overlap

Ageing does not always mean disability - yet many **policy and research opportunities** are shared. Addressing them requires collaboration across both ageing and disability sectors.

### What challenges can we address together?



- **Data gaps:** Build stronger evidence on older people with disabilities, particularly lived experiences and unmet needs.
- **Workforce pressures:** Plan for sustainable recruitment, training, and retention to meet rising demand.
- **Informal carers:** Provide greater recognition and support as carer numbers continue to grow.
- **Ageing carers:** Develop policies that address the vulnerabilities of carers who are ageing themselves.
- **Inclusive policy-making:** Ensure older people with disabilities are included in decisions on housing, urban design, and social connection.
- **New models of care and housing:** Create and evaluate models that reflect disability across the lifespan.
- **Emerging technologies:** Address the impact of AI and digital tools on care, access, and decision-making.
- **Preparedness:** Strengthen disaster and emergency planning to meet the needs of older people with disabilities.



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
